


Evolution of the RJC and its System – a snapshot

2010	System implementation for > RJC Members and new standards programs commencing




Geographical Location of RJC Members

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Business Case for RJC Certification



- **Common standard** opportunity to avoid duplication.
- Credible System third party auditing, stakeholder involvement and consultation.
- Support tools and guidance, training.
- Consumer recognition a label of confidence.
- Cost effective one cost of development of the standard and system for all; large competing pool of auditors.





RJC Code of Practices

Defines responsible ethical, human rights, social, and environmental practices for businesses in the diamond, gold and platinum metals jewellery supply chain.

Based on national and international law, established international and industry standards and sound business practices.

Establishes objective and verifiable standards against which RJC Members may be certified.

This is a living document and will undergo content review as applicable.

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Business Ethics - upholding ethical business practices.

Human Rights and Social Performance - upholding fundamental human rights, treating workers fairly and with respect, encouraging a diverse workforce, and provision of a safe working environment.

Environmental Performance - promoting efficient use of resources and energy, and reducing and preventing pollution.

Management Systems - compliance with applicable law, establishing policy, and managing business risks including Contractors, Suppliers and Partners.





RJC Certification of Members

What	Conformance with RJC Code of Practices for responsible business practices.
Who	Independent 3 rd party auditors verify RJC Member companies.
How	Members carry out a Self Assessment against the Code. Auditors conduct verification with desktop reviews and visits to facilities.
When	Within 2 years of joining the Council
Why	Certified Members can provide assurance to customers, suppliers, regulators and stakeholders of responsible business practices against a common industry standard.

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Auditor Accreditation

- RJC Management Team is carrying out accreditation of auditors.
- Accreditation reflects the RJC's endorsement of an auditor's competence and integrity. Auditors must take additional training on the RJC System.

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RJC expands System Scope to include Platinum Metals

- At the last Annual General Meeting, RJC's Members voted to include platinum metals in the scope of the RJC System.
- These are the first materials to be added to the RJC's original target materials of diamonds and gold.
- The Members also voted to give the RJC Board the responsibility to determine when other materials should be added to the RJC System's scope.



Platinum Metals - transition

Timeframes:

- RJC is now positioned to welcome new members who are part of the jewellery supply chain in the platinum metals jewellery.
- The formal RJC System documents will be amended as part of the 2012 standards review.
 Platinum will be in scope for RJC Certification after these documents are re-issued.



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RJC and Chain-of-Custody

Certifying Members' responsible business practices √ Certifying chain-of-custody systems ?

In 2010, RJC is investigating the feasibility of developing a standard for independent, third party certification of <u>chain-of-custody systems</u>.

- Voluntary
- Complementary to RJC Member certification
- Not a chain-of-custody platform for industry

Investigating how it can best add value to the industry.



Why the RJC?

RJC has:

- established and agreed standards for responsible business practices
- applicable to the supply chain from mine to retail
- independent, third party assurance system.

RJC chain-of-custody certification *could*:

- provide a common, mutually recognised, industrywide standard for certification
- support on-product and business-to-business claims re responsible production of diamonds, gold and platinum metals.
